Portland Local Recalls The Hartford Circus Fire

as told to George M Gilbert III of the Portland Historical Society

Thursday, July 6th, 1944 started off as an exciting day for ten year old Wayne (Duffy) Duff. Wayne's mother Doroathea and he were going to spend quality mother-son time at the Ringling Brothers and Barnum and Bailey Circus. The circus was close-by, it was being held in Hartford that day. Duffy lived on Main Street, in the Gildersleeve section of Portland



in 1944 with his mother who was a registered nurse. She was a young working mother in her thirties employed at Elmcrest Manor in Portland. This day would give her some well deserved time off from her job as well as

enjoying quality time with her son. Duffy remembers the morning of July 6th being hot and humid from day start with the temperature exceeding 100 degrees F. mid afternoon.

Mother and son left Portland that morning being driven by a friend without knowing they would be survivors of the most devastating circus fire in history. The circus had about 8,000 (est) people in attendance that afternoon. This fire would claim over 160 lives and over 700 injuries. Duffy explains that the circus was laid out with three big rings. Their seating that morning was supposed to start at the south ring along the wall. After sitting there for a while waiting for the show to begin Doroathea decided to change seats. They moved from section "C" to better seats in section "E" that were located in the center ring. Duffy feels that if they did not change seats that day he would not be here today. Most of the fatalities that occurred happened right along the wall where Duffy and his mom were initially sitting in section "C".

The "Lion Show" had just finished and the "Flying Wallendas" were performing as the fire broke out. According to Duffy he heard May Kovar who was an animal trainer shouting "fight". It took a few seconds to register that she was actually shouting "fire". He and his mom were sitting by a railing so they quickly scaled the rail jumping

down about two feet and started running towards a side entrance that was used to let show animals in the tent. They managed to exit out of that entrance and Duffy just remembers running, running and running away from the blaze to a nearby field. He heard screaming and yelling of the panicked people behind him. "If you tripped and fell there was a very good chance that you couldn't get up and you would be trampled by the mob of people trying to flee the inferno", he added. When asking about his mom, Duffy remembers not leaving her side, "I stayed right with her" he said. Their good seating and quick actions that day helped them beat the crowds out of the fiery big top. Time Magazine called the Hartford Circus Fire "the worst circus disaster in U.S. history".

Duffy recounts and still remembers vividly the horrors of the fire on that tragic day. On July 6th 2023 Duffy, his daughter Tammy and son in law Wally visited the Circus Fire Memorial in Hartford. On July 6th 2004 ground was

broken for the Memorial This is located in the rear of the Wish School on 350 Barbour Street, Hartford which is the same property that the fire occurred almost 80 years ago. The monument center is where the bigtop was located. On the monument it has the names of each of the fire victims embossed on the top of the memorial. Surrounding the memorial are bricks in remembrance of all the victims, those that perished and those who were able to escape.

Wayne (Duffy) Duff has been a member of the Portland #2 Volunteer Fire Department for 71 years. This Fire Department is located in the Gildersleeve section of town and was formerly known as Engine Company #2 in Gildersleeve. At 89 years old Duffy is still a member of #2 Fire Department, however, he is no longer going out on fire calls.

A BLACK HISTORY MONTH PANEL



On February 24, 2024, the Portland Historical Society, along with the Portland Library and the Portland Committee on Solidarity hosted "Gallery of Portland: A Black History Panel" in the auditorium of the historic Brownstone Intermediate School on Main Street. Following welcoming remarks from First Selectman Ryan Curley, a panel composed of Patricia Hall Jemison, David Roane, Barbara Shaw and Rev. Laurence Woods reflected on what it was like to live "under the bridge" in Portland during the 1960's and 1970's. Bob McDougall, Director and Trustee of the Portland Historical Society Museum, was the facilitator for the panel. Naji Chester-Payne, Portland's Poet Laureate, created and presented a new poem at the close of the program.

The Portland Historical Society is in the process of researching the Portland Redevelopment Agency (PRA), and its work from 1965 to 1980. The PRA was tasked with redeveloping the south end of Portland, (under the bridge), including Lower Main Street, Wolcott Street, Airline Avenue, Bank Street and South Bank Street. This area is now the Portland Industrial Park. The Society is seeking additional pictures and firsthand accounts about this area of town. The "Gallery of Portland" was well attended, with approximately 70 people in attendance. One attendee described the program as "powerful, touching and emotional". The Society would like to thank everyone involved in producing this program.



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Outgoing President's Report:



2023 marked the 50th anniversary of the Portland Historical Society and it was a banner year for us. I am very proud of our board who contributed no less than 2,425 volunteer hours to honor our mission by bringing forth several special exhibits and events in celebration of this milestone. I am pleased to report 166 total memberships (some of which comprise families) including 40 life members.

This past summer we were able to focus on two major undertakings: showcasing the works of 19th century artist John Wells Stancliff in *A Portland Artist Comes Home* at the Portland Public Library. We also participated in the Arrigoni Bridge Stamp Commemoration.

In addition to our 12th annual Festival of Wreaths and our 27th annual Town-Wide Tag Sale, we published three newsletters, held virtual cemetery tours, and began revising and updating both our bylaws and our strategic plan.

Our doors were open for half a dozen talks and book signings and we took advantage of some wonderful virtual workshops and in-person gatherings as well. More than 500 people attended our events this past year!

Funding from the **CT Humanities Grant** we received and will focus on organizing our Collections and work on caring for more than 7,700 items. As caretakers and custodians of the Ruth Callander House Museum, we are focusing on looking inward and assessing the physical needs of our headquarters to ensure that the treasures housed there are well preserved and accessible to the public, from students to scholars. A work in progress.

In 2023 the PHS worked closely with our **community partners**: The Portland Public Library, The Waverly Senior Center, Bartlett Hill, The CT Cover Club, The Hemlock Grange and Trinity Church. We are also indebted to numerous local individuals who have generously offered their talents and time to us: Alain Munkittrick, Lynn Fountain, Ryan Curley, Brian Magee, Sarah Elliott Caratasios, Jenn Billingsley, Jonathan Ives, John Stewart and Candace Hueblein, Deborah and Ron Payne, Jos. 
